# TILE $\delta ~ T E R R A ~ C O T T A ~ N E W S: ~$ MEMADJ TILE IN SOUTHSIDE CHICAGO 

Located in the Beverly Hills neighborhood of Chicago is a handsome Tudor revival residence from 1928 designed by architect Murray Hetherington. Inside are many rooms dazzling with tile. Glazed faience is in all the bathrooms, as well as Valencia mosaic from the Continental Faience \& Tile Company of South Milwaukee, Wisconsin in the foyer. Of particular interest is the solarium. Its cozy, warm earth tones of unglazed, fire-flashed pavers are charmed with decorative inserts of plants and animals. Who made these fabulous tiles? Well, as the research shows, they are attributed to Nemadji Tile \& Pottery Company of Moose Lake, Minnesota.

According to Joseph Taylor of the Tile Heritage Foundation, there are only two other known sites with these decorative tiles. One is an installation from 1929 at the entrance to Tower Hall at the College of St. Scholastica in Duluth, Minnesota. The other is also from 1928 inside the lobby of an apartment building known as Hampton Hall in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania (identified by Michael Padwee).

According to Michelle Lee, author of The Myth and Magic of Nemadji "Indian" Pottery(Left Hand Publishing Co., 2004), she is confident that these inserts were made by the Minnesota manufacturer. Her evidence is that they were featured in installations with Nemadji field tile and that several of the small tiles were excavated at the site of the original tile plant.

The six-inch decorative tiles are the real "show stopper" in this installation. They are unglazed like the field tile and were created with buff and red clays. There are a total of twenty-one inserts, including 3 griffins, 5 squirrels, 3 elephants, and 10 owls. More photos are a

In another residence built concurrently in the same neighborhood and the same architect was another Nemadji tile installation. This one is in the vestibule. Even though there is less tile, the designs are equally entertaining. Several four-inch designs were used, including a portrait with its tongue sticking out, two animals with their heads nestled together, and a portrait of a person with their hair braided and tied in a bun. As far as it is known, these tiles have yet to be identified in other installations.

Because of generous homeowners like these Chicago residents who were willing to share their homes, these beautiful tiles can be shared with the tile community and more can be learned about the Nemadji Tile \& Pottery Co. In respect of the homeowners' privacy, their names remain anonymous and addresses are anonymous.
